



1 Brick School Garden

One School Street

On the grounds of the historic brick school, this garden was planted in 2002 as a Heritage Committee beautification project. Designed by Claudia Everest, the landscape is park-like and features low-maintenance plantings, including pink rose bushes.



2 Library Gardens

14 Main Street

Three different gardens decorate the library grounds. Beds of annuals and perennials line the path to the entrance, a colorful "front garden" enhances the building's facade, and in back is a "reading garden," designed by Claudia Everest, with specimen trees and shrubs, places to sit, and a fountain.



3 South Triangle

Route 122 and Old Nashua Road

Located in the "Ponemah" section of town, this informal roadside garden was created in 1990 by garden club president Mary Anne Conaway and is now dedicated to her memory. The garden contains a colorful mix of drought-tolerant perennials, as well as a tall granite marker.



4 Moulton's Oval

10 Main Street (Moulton's Market)

Completely renovated in 2015, this petite garden with a granite border overflows with a colorful mix of shrubs, perennials, and annuals in shades of blue, yellow, and white.



5 North Triangle

Route 122 and Narragansett Road

This busy traffic island was transformed into a garden in 1992. It features drought-tolerant shrubs and perennials. The centerpiece is a monument in memory of notable Amherst citizen Bertha Rogers.



6 Police Complex Gardens

175 Amherst Street

Since 1997, the garden club has helped beautify the grounds of the Amherst police station. Native shrubs and beds of annuals and perennials decorate the road sign, building, and the pathway to the public entrance.



7 Sunset Road Triangle

Boston Post Road and Sunset Lane

This once bare traffic island was transformed by the garden club in 2000. At center stands a Sargent cherry tree, surrounded by hardy, old-fashioned perennial favorites.



8 Town Hall Gardens

Two Main Street

Each spring the garden club fills the historic round horse trough with colorful annuals and places containers of flowers on the Town Hall front steps. Behind the building is a pretty little shade garden planted by the club in 2005.



9 West Village Triangle

Main Street and Amherst Street

At the west end of the village, the garden club planted easy-maintenance flowering shrubs and perennials around the "Welcome to Amherst" sign.



10 Wigwam Museum Garden

17 Middle Street

Located behind the Historical Society Wigwam Museum, this enchanting garden is brimming with plants and ornaments, including custom-made trellises and a bench that invites visitors to sit and enjoy.
